He has recently returned from leading photo workshops in Ecuador where he and his students concentrated on taking photos (really good photos) of the many, many hummingbird species that reside in that part of the world. You will hardly believe the variety and beauty of these little birds

Ralph is a renowned nature photographer and leader of photo workshop tours. When he isn't gallivanting around the world, he lives in Ridgecrest. He says on his website: "My photographs have been published in such magazines as **Outdoor Photographer**, **WildBird** (including several covers), **Birder's World**, **Birdwatcher's Digest**, **Nature and Wildlife**, **Martha Stewart Living**, and **Outdoor Traveler**. February

The **Greater White-fronted Goose** remained at the golf course through at least Feb 24 (SLS).

The adult **Tundra Swan** continued at the ponds through at least Feb 3 (SLS).

A **Common Merganser** was at the ponds Feb 26 (RAB).

FOS for **American White Pelican** was from the ponds Feb 23 (SLS).

The **Merlin** in Ridgecrest Feb 3 was a new yard bird (RAB). The **Merlin** at the golf course was seen again on Feb 23 (SLS).

The **Greater Roadrunners** SW of Inyokern were sitting on their nest Feb 11 (LK).

FOS for **Rufous Hummingbird** was from SW of Inyokern Feb 26 (PW).

A **Red-naped Sapsucker** was at the college Feb 5 (RAB).

The three **Stellar's Jays** in Cow Heaven Canyon were the first seen in the valley since Mar 28, 2009 (SLS).

FOS for **Tree Swallows** was from the ponds Feb 24 (SLS).

FOS for **Violet-green Swallow** was from the college Feb 20 (L&SSu).

Red-breasted Nuthatch continue at the college (RAB).

Up to twenty-nine **Mountain Bluebirds** remained at the golf course through Feb 24 (RAB, SLS).

The **Townsend's Solitaire** continued on the base through at least Feb 8 (SLS).

The **LeConte's Thrashers** SW of Inyokern first nest of the season failed due to wind Feb 18 (LK).

The **Gray-headed Junco** subspecies of the Dark-eyed Junco at the college Feb 5 was only the 19th time this type has been seen in the valley (RAB). It remained through at least Feb 27 (RAB).

Cassin's Finches were in Freeman Canyon Feb 26 (SLS, SE).

The **Pine Siskin** S of Inyokern Feb 26 was the first seen since Nov 20 (SLS).

March

The **Greater White-fronted Goose** continued through at least Mar 29 (SLS).

A large flock of **Snow/Ross's Geese** was heading north Mar 9 (SLS). While most of the geese were gone within a couple days of the 9th, a flock of forty was seen at the evaporation fields on Mar 22 (L&SSu) and ten remain at the golf course (SLS).

The adult **Tundra Swan** continued at the ponds through Mar 11 (SLS).

A pair of **Wood Duck** was at the ponds Mar 16 (RAB).

A pair of **Hooded Merganser** was at the ponds Mar 9 (SLS).

A male **Red-breasted Merganser** was at the ponds Mar 22 (SLS).

A **Great Egret** was in the desert SW of Inyokern Mar 21 (LK).

Five **Ospreys** were noted Mar 20, one was SW of Inyokern (LK), one was along Highway 395 at No Name Canyon (SLS), and three were by Pearsonville (JLD). Another **Osprey** was SW of Inyokern Mar 28 (LK).

A **Merlin** was at the ponds Mar 1 (RAB).

A **Peregrine Falcon** was at the ponds Mar 3 (SLS).

First of spring (FOS) for **Black-bellied Plover** was from the ponds Mar 7 (SLS).

FOS for **Least Sandpiper** and **Dunlin** was from the ponds Mar 22, and for **Whimbrel** was from the golf course Mar 23 (SLS).

FOS for **Cliff Swallows** was Mar 11, for **Northern Rough-winged Swallows** was Mar 3, for **Bank Swallow** was 23 Mar, which is earlier than expected all from the ponds (SLS).

FOS for **Western Kingbird** was from the base Mar 15 (BS).

FOS for **Warbling Vireo** was from the college Mar 30 (SLS).

Red-breasted Nuthatches continue at the college (JAS), in SE Ridgecrest (LS), and at the cemetery (SLS).

The first **House Wren** of the spring was from the college Mar 12 (JAS).

The **Townsend's Solitaire** remained at the base through at least Mar 29 (SLS).

FOS for **Blue-grey Gnatcatcher** was from SW of Inyokern Mar 29 (LK).

FOS for **Orange-crowned Warbler** was from S of Inyokern Mar 21 (SLS).

FOS for **Chipping** and **Brewer's Sparrow** was from the college Mar 29 (SLS).

A **Fox Sparrow** was in Sand Canyon Mar 5 (LS). A "Sooty" **Fox Sparrow** was S of Inyokern Mar 21 (SLS) and "Thick-billed" **Fox Sparrows** were in Indian Wells Canyon Mar 26 (SLS, SE).

The **Gray-headed Junco** subspecies of the Dark-eyed Junco remained at the college through at least Mar 8 (SLS).

FOS for **Yellow-headed Blackbird** was from the ponds Mar 25 (SLS).

FOS for **Hooded Oriole** was from Ridgecrest Mar 19 (CG).

Lawrence's Goldfinches are in the valley in big numbers this spring and it looks like they are trying to breed. Five **Lawrence's Goldfinches** were at the college Mar 12 and a female had nesting material (JAS). They were seen after that on most visits (L&SSu, SLS, RAB). The two **Lawrence's Goldfinches** SW of Inyokern Mar 13 and 28 were a new yard bird (LK). Other Lawrence's Goldfinches were at the cemetery and S of Inyokern (SLS).

Pine Siskins were S of Inyokern Mar 12 and 21 (SLS) and in SE Ridgecrest Mar 16-17 (LS).

BIRDATHON

The 22nd annual Kerncrest Audubon Society BIRDATHON will be held Saturday, April 30th. We need you to form a team – even if it's only a team of one -- and sign up sponsors to contribute in support of the Kern River Preserve and our education programs. If you'd like to join, be, or form, a team, phone Nancy Robinson at 760-375-2049. Teams can meet at any time or place they like, but it's best to let Nancy know where you plan to go, so that she can provide a "clearing house" to ensure maximum coverage of the area to maximize the number of species seen.

We'll bird all day (and all night, starting at sundown on the 6th, if you want to get owls) then meet at a to-be-designated pizza parlor to compare and consolidate lists, and to celebrate!

Proceeds are split between the Kern River Preserve and our own education programs. This past year's education funds were spent primarily on expenses for the Faller and Inyokern Elementary School Junior Audubon Clubs. We can't think of a better way to ensure these children retain their excitement about birds!

So sign up for a Birdathon Team, and sign up friends and acquaintances too. Collect pledges from friends wishing to sponsor by number of species seen, or contributions from those making lump sum contributions, and bring them to the Birdathon. If you wish to contribute by species, please note the pledge by species and include your telephone number, so someone can call you after the event and let you know how many species were sighted.

CONSERVATION CORNER

Yea Spring!! Greening trees, the sweet perfume of billions of wildflowers, yellow hillsides and desert flats (with more to come), bird migrants – birds and people looking for them, nest building, warmth for all, baby lizards, fruits and veggies growing....The birds are likely benefiting from the marvelous wildflower displays (as are we).

I want to mention building brush piles again. I hear from friends with yards in town, or small yards, that they can't do them. Well, 2 of my friends have and are reaping the benefits. Unsightliness is mentioned, but that doesn't have to be. Explain to worried neighbors what you are trying to accomplish – instant safety for birds avoiding predators. Planting flowers around a pile can "pretty" them up. Even small piles are useful to birds and lizards and other important small members of a working backyard ecosystem. There is no need for a carefully constructed brush pile, if you don't have the room or inclination. Sticking the odd branch out gives great perches.

Quail, Roadrunners, White-crowns, Finches, Warblers, Wrens, Towhees, Mockers and more will appreciate your efforts.

One of my haphazard brush piles has been home to Antelope ground squirrels for many years. I can't even imagine the invertebrate life that benefits. LeConte's Thrashers used it from top to bottom. Another open brush pile was made from downed trees. We faced the stem end to the wind and that structure has survived 60+mph winds year after year. So, have fun. (less trips to the dump!)

I would like to encourage you (again), if you haven't already, to become a member of 2 local and very important conservation groups. Red Rock Canyon Interpretive Association and Audubon California Kern River Preserve. RRCIA has done such a wonderful job of educating visitors to the marvels of Red Rock Canyon, now at 27,000 acres! The wildflower displays, the geology, the fossils, the hiking, the dark sky wonders, the home to Golden Eagles, Great Horned Owls, Prairie Falcons, LeConte's Thrashers, numerous other birds, large and small. Our jewel of a Preserve that grows larger every year, Kern River Preserve, is world-class and visited by people from all over the world. Have you been there lately? The South Fork of the Kern River has changed course on the Preserve! We won't know the full extent of the changes until summer, but, Wow, the Power of Water! A new habitat is being constructed on the Sprague Ranch that we hope will lure a colony of endangered Tricolored Blackbirds to its location. It is not ready yet, but should be a hit with the Tricoloreds and other wetland birds. The Preserve welcomes visitors year-round daily as well as to festivals, butterfly and bird counts.
